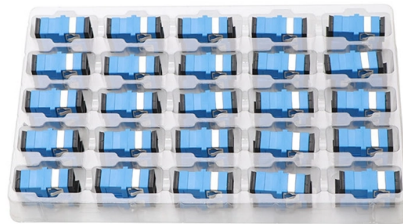

CMR cables are commonly installed in vertical cable trays within riser shafts to maintain organized and safe routing of communication and low-voltage cables. When installed in cable trays, CMR cables must be secured at intervals and comply with NEC guidelines to ensure proper fire safety and mechanical protection.

- Installation Environment:** Use CMR cables for vertical riser shafts and floor-to-floor runs; avoid using them in plenum or air-handling spaces.
- Fire Safety:** CMR cables limit flame propagation between floors, providing enhanced safety over general-purpose CM cables.
- Data Performance:** The CMR rating does not define Ethernet speed or bandwidth; Cat5e, Cat6, or Cat6A CMR cables determine data performance.
- Compliance:** Ensure cables are UL listed and meet NEC fire-resistance standards for riser applications.
