- 4. Alignment and Leveling** Ensure brackets are vertically aligned and level to maintain proper tray orientation. Misalignment can cause uneven cable distribution, stress on tray joints, and difficulty during cable installation.
- 5. Installation Procedure** Mark bracket positions on the wall according to the layout plan. Drill and install anchors or fasteners suitable for the wall type. Attach brackets securely, checking for level and plumb alignment. Mount the cable tray onto the brackets, ensuring it is fully supported along its vertical run. Use additional fittings such as vertical bends or T-pieces where direction changes occur.
