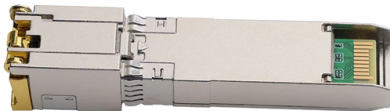


Terminal box to network cable

Connecting a network cable to a terminal box involves stripping the cable, following wiring standards, inserting wires into the correct terminals, and securing them for a reliable connection.

Use either T568A or T568B wiring standards consistently on both ends of the cable. T568B is commonly used in the U.S. The wire order for T568B is: Orange/White, Orange, Green/White, Blue, Blue/White, Green, Brown/White, Brown ().
- Insert Wires into Terminal Box**
For a screw terminal block, insert each stripped wire into the corresponding terminal slot and tighten the screw to secure it (). For a punch-down junction box, use a punch-down tool to press each wire into the IDC slot, ensuring a firm connection ().
- Secure the Cable**
Ensure the cable is clamped or fixed inside the terminal box to prevent movement, which could loosen connections over time ().
- Test the Connection**
Use a network tester to verify continuity and correct wiring. This step ensures there are no miswires or signal issues before finalizing the installation ().
- Close the Terminal Box**
Once all connections are verified, close the terminal box cover to protect the wires from dust and physical stress ().

Tips for Reliable Connections

- Use ferrules for stranded wires to prevent fraying and ensure a clean connection ().
- Avoid overfilling terminals, as this can cause arcing or connection failure ().
- Plan cable routes to avoid interference from electrical wiring or water pipes ().
